### **Buyer Notes**

- Having retractable, under-seat seatbelts make it much easier to strap residents into the vehicle, and saves the driver time. They also can keep residents from tripping when entering the vehicle.
- Several dealers recommend power remote mirrors that drivers can adjust without having to get out of the vehicle. Facilities in colder climates also might want to consider heated mirrors that don't freeze over or fog up in cold weather.
- If you plan to use buses for longer road trips, amenities such as television monitors and DVD players are a luxury operators might want to consider, one dealer said.
- Just as with a car, the lifespan for buses can range greatly depending on how much preventive maintenance an operator is willing to perform. If the average mileage of a bus is 12,000 miles per year, an operator can realistically expect to keep the same vehicle for 7 to 10 years, one vendor explained.
